CECA SOUTH WEST CHAIR'S WELCOME

It's been a real pleasure and privilege to represent the South West civil engineering contracting industry this past year and although I've been absent for some of that time for health reasons, I'm already looking forward to what we can achieve together in 2026.

Once again, it's been a challenging year for contractors in the region and a mixed picture in terms of the work pipeline. Water companies are only now starting to deliver on their promise of a bonanza of opportunities for the supply chain under AMP8. Similarly, the rail sector under the CP7 framework is falling short on its future work pipeline for the Tier 2s. The SMEs and Tier 2s have been hurting as a result. Highways too is a testing environment with local councils strapped for money for both capital and maintenance schemes. But contrast that with the defence and energy sectors which are buzzing with potential work opportunities from the MoD, DIO, Babcock, National Grid and a number of South West ports who are developing proposals for turbine lay-down areas to service the impending Celtic Array offshore windfarm.

Continuing on an upbeat theme, CECA South West is getting ever closer to realising its plans for a new civil engineering construction hub at Chudleigh in Devon with member company, Bridge and training provider, AccXel making it possible. Our proposal is currently going through planning with Teignbridge District Council who have been extremely supportive so far. Potential start-up costs are looking increasingly likely to be met by the newly formed Devon & Torbay Combined Authority which will begin to receive devolved powers and funding from central Government in April 2026 so that it can actively promote and support adult skills and local economic development. Believe me, it will happen – and soon!

CECA South West continues to provide its members with a full training programme and comprehensive client engagement. Increasingly high-profile guest speakers at its quarterly members' meetings have resulted in increasing numbers of attendees on a regular basis. Our ongoing commitment to encouraging new talent into our industry continues ever more strongly, not only by way of the proposed training hub (previously mentioned) but also through the dedicated efforts of the CECA South West Foundations

Group. Throughout the year, this Group has attended careers' fairs and given presentations to schools and colleges as well as starring in our latest industry-leading recruitment video: 'Where Are They Now?'. These young engineers and technicians deserve our heartfelt thanks, as do their employers who allow them the time to contribute so wholeheartedly.

Back in October, CECA's 'Better Infrastructure' conference took place at Sandy Park with client and contractor speakers representing every sector of our industry on the themes of resilience and decarbonisation. Over 100 delegates and exhibitors attended this key event.

Whilst all this goes on in our region, CECA's national team in Westminster, led by Policy and Public Affairs Director, Ben Goodwin continues to champion the issues of most concern to South West members. Regular engagement with MPs, government ministers, the Construction Leadership Council, CITB and the various procurement organisations has led to recent successes including mitigating the extent of the proposed hike in landfill tax and achieving greater visibility of the work pipeline in the public sector. Holding the Government to task on the importance of civil engineering infrastructure spending remains a key objective for CECA. This follows its adoption by the incoming Labour Party in its manifesto – a policy decision which CECA lobbied for strongly before and during the last General Election.

On a final note, I have to say that I'm very much looking forward to working with and continuing to represent CECA South West members during my second term as your Chair, to help make this a safer and more prosperous industry for everyone.

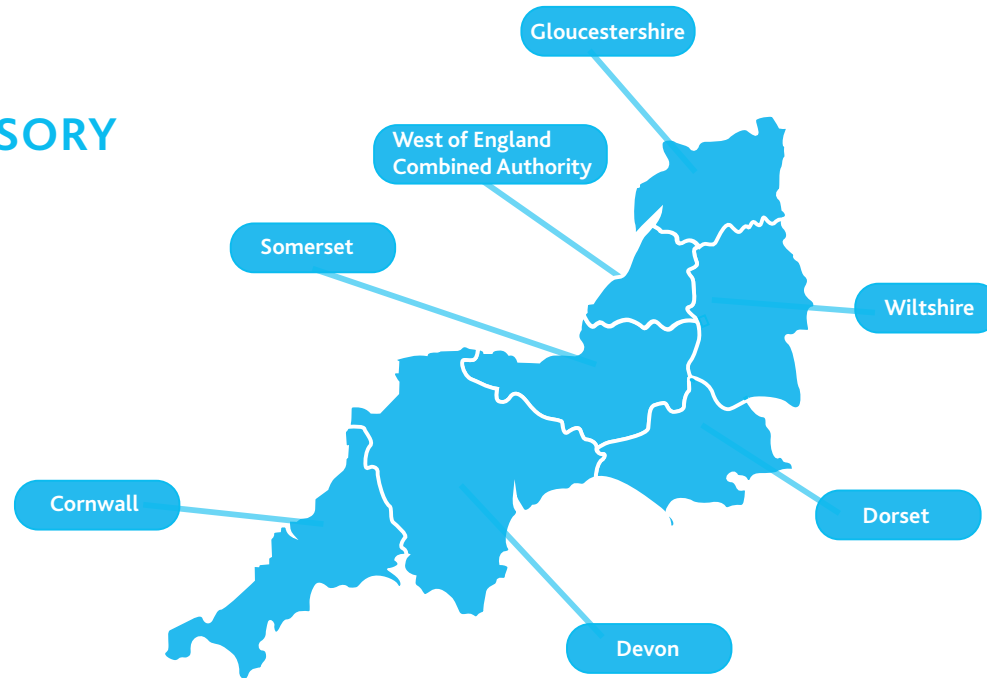

Through proactive advocacy and strategic collaboration, CECA represents members' interests on procurement, fair payment, and regulatory frameworks. This pillar also monitors market conditions and supports visibility of future workloads, helping civil engineering contractors plan effectively. By aligning industry needs with government strategy, CECA drives a stable and productive environment for delivering national infrastructure.



SUSTAINABILITY & SOCIAL VALUE

CECA's work in the sustainability and social value space ensures that our members are positioned to implement sustainable practices across the sector, decarbonising operations, and increasing the social value of the schemes that they deliver. In particular, this involves aligning with the Construction Leadership Council's CO₂nstructZero programme, which is working to ensure industry moves towards a net zero future, eliminating diesel use on sites, adopting new technologies and solutions, and engaging in co-ordinated collective action to meet the climate crisis.

CECA South West delivers a full and varied programme of training courses for its members - ranging from NEC4 Contract Conditions through to Temporary Works Coordinator/Supervisor and SMSTS/SSSTS health and safety sessions; from Management of Quality/Subcontractors/Risk through to Effective Communication training and from a highly respected Management Development NVQ Level 6 & 7 programme to New Entrants' Practical Skills and Site Surveying residential courses at the National Construction College in Bircham Newton.

CECA training professionals **Glenn Hide (GMH Planning)** and **Bob Bilbrough (Robert Bilbrough Associates)** deliver the majority of these courses together with **2020 Safety Solutions**. There are also health and safety mock trials and legal training webinars available to members via our legal partners, **DAC Beachcroft**.

Proposed New South West Civil Engineering Training Hub:

CECA members are getting closer to having their own bespoke training hub for groundworkers and plant operators in the South West. Bridge Civil Engineering will provide the premises and external training area at its head office in Chudleigh, training provision will come from AccXel and contractor support is guaranteed via CECA SW members.

A recent CECA SW survey to members has helped to shape the content of the proposed apprenticeship(s), fully aligned to employer needs. The proposal is currently going through planning and has received encouraging support from Teignbridge DC, the newly formed Devon & Torbay Combined Authority, National Highways and the South West Business Council. A recent visit from **Shadow Chancellor, Sir Mel Stride** to Bridge's offices has helped this initiative gain further traction.

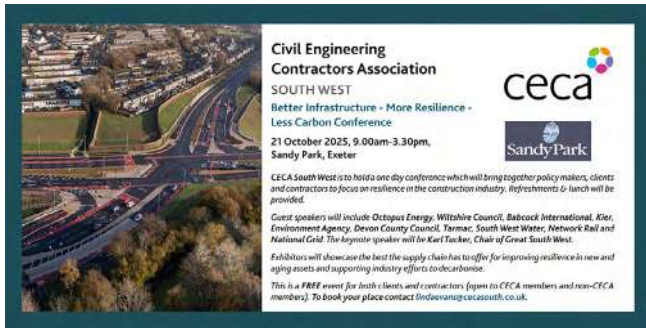
HEALTH, SAFETY & WELLBEING - Creating a Safer Workplace

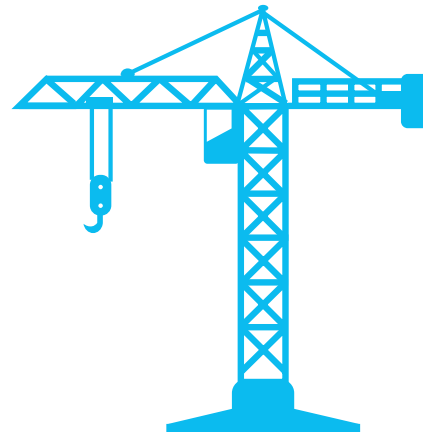
